Parish Council 'Round-up'

It seems a long time since the last 'round-up' was published in a paper version of the *Forward* and in that time we have moved from Spring to Autumn!

The Council have continued to be as active as possible throughout lockdown, assisted by the many amazing volunteers who supported friends and neighbours who were shielding or required extra help during this challenging time.

Whilst Covid19 management strategies forced us to reduce our activities in some areas, they also offered opportunities for us to be creative, and resourceful in carrying on our daily lives and helping our communities to stay safe and strong.

In Keyingham many of us were able to enjoy our gardens and allotments, and thanks to the extra attention and an unusually warm spring they all looked vibrant and beautiful throughout the summer.

The PC were able to quietly get on with keeping the village looking clean, tidy and well kept. Many residents 'stepped-up' to look after sections of grass verge while ERYC staff were furloughed and our regular Garden Contractor and Street Cleaner each continued to work as normal throughout the period and we are very grateful for their efforts.

We have been able to arrange the hedge cutting which we planned earlier in the season and have taken the opportunity to make some essential repairs to fencing and equipment on each of the amenity areas.

The Boyes Lane Amenity Area continues to be developed thanks to the hard work of 'a few good folk' who dedicate much of their spare time to its management. New features include an outdoor stage for open air concerts which was given a thor-

ough testing on 31st August when live bands played throughout the evening. All proceeds from the event will go towards an electrical supply to the field. The planting of a wild-flower meadow is currently under discussion and wildlife in the area is thriving, as evidenced by the activity captured on our wildlife cameras.

The last two meetings the Council have been held via 'Zoom' which has proved to be a valuable means of communication when face to face meetings were not possible. The format of the October meeting of the PC scheduled Wednesday 14th has not yet been confirmed, though public participation via 'Zoom' is welcome and can be arranged by contacting the Clerk by 5.00pm on the day of the meeting.

There have been no new planning matters to consider except to note the conditions placed on the development at Horrox Court. Those plans already 'in process' remain as 'pending consideration' by ERYC planning Committee.

The Council have been advised by the Royal British Legion that there should be no parades or gatherings planned for Remembrance Day on Sunday 8th November 2020 and that commemorations should be carried out privately. A socially distanced service will take place at St Nicholas Church, at 10.00am with a prayer of remembrance and observation of two minutes silence at 11.00. A representative of the PC will lay a wreath will at the war memorial at 11.00. and a minister representing both Churches will offer a prayer. The PC would be grateful if you would join in observing the 2 minutes silence

from your own homes. Anyone who wishes to lay a wreath is welcome to do so, though times will need to be staggered to ensure social distancing. If you do wish to lay a wreath please contact the Parish Clerk in the first instance.

Recently Council activities have included responding to requests for waste bins at the bus stops between Keyingham ad Bridge Bungalows, which have been agreed and are on ERYC highways schedule of works.

Utilising some of the grant funding we received from ERVAS the PC have planted 4 fruit trees at Boyes Lane, and a plum tree at the Allotments in memory of Ann and Joe Tripp, two of our dear friends and allotment gardeners who sadly died recently.

Repairs have been carried out to play equipment and safety fencing on the amenity areas. A dropped curb and path have been installed close to the defibrillator on Saltaugh Road, thanks to ERYC Highways dept, who provided this for us free of charge.

The PC have been in close communication with representatives of Holderness Heath, providing feedback on the recent changes and reflecting your experiences of using the services. The CEO and Services Manager have kindly agreed to attend the first face to face meeting of the PC, whenever it is deemed appropriate and safe to hold one.

The Council accounts were subject to annual audit in March. The accounts and the report of the first stage of this process is on the Council website.

Last Sunday members of the PC were present to welcome our new Vicar, Rev. Alasdair Laird on the occasion of his first service at St Nicholas Church Keyingham.

Cllr David Clark offered a warm welcome to Rev. Alasdair on behalf of the PC and Residents of Keyingham, extending our good wishes for his new role and expressing our desire to work together for the benefit of the whole community.

Rev. Alastair joins us from Castle Hill Hospital where he was Chaplain, providing support to patients, families and hospital staff during lockdown.

When regular 'face to face' PC meetings resume the PC will continue to meet on the second Wednesday of every month **at the earlier time of at 7.00pm** in the Village Hall.

Council are always keen to receive your ideas and feedback on any matter affecting the Community of Keyingham and this can still be done via email and telephone.

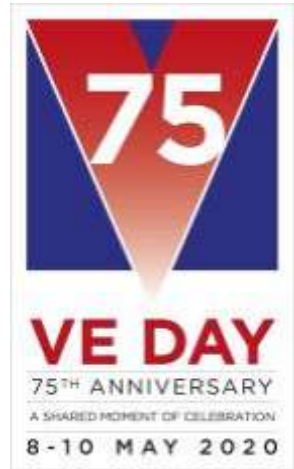

A message from Rev'd Alisdair Laird:

Greetings to all of you. In these unusual times it may be a while yet before we do manage to meet face to face! In the meantime I can tell you that Ann and I are settling in and very happy to finally be here! Bobby the dog and Reggie the cat are also enjoying their new surroundings. On the human front, all our children are grown and gone. There have been mutterings about having to trek right through Hull and miles out into the countryside beyond, but the ones who have made the trip so far have been delighted with the big skies and the beauty of a landscape and villages they have never really explored. Ann is a village girl from down south, and I come from as far away as you can get on the planet without starting to come back. We both get back to New Zealand now and again to catch up with family, but East Yorkshire has been 'home' now for quite a few years.

Of course people have been settled in South Holderness for thousands of years. One of those areas blessed with an 'edge-of-the-world' quality that reminds us that we are not as 'in control' as we often like to imagine, and that perhaps our horizons can

really be bigger than we often allow them to be. The pandemic has the same effect, highlighting the daily truth of all our lives: that we are not as in control as we often like to imagine, and that we really do need each other, along with that vision that helps us to see the bigger picture, a wider horizon, of lives lived in the midst of something greater and more wonderful than we know.
