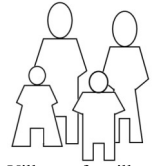

### **Keeping safe and Looking After Each Other..**

# Parish Council 'Round-up'

Looking back at the round-up for December and January it is apparent that the focus of Council activity has changed greatly since then especially so in the past few days and likewise our priorities for the coming weeks.

In the early part of the year the Council plans were affected by adverse weather and members were disappointed that it had not been possible to proceed with tree planting, hedge cutting and general repairs in readiness for Spring.

We are hopeful that some of these works will be completed by the end of March, though in the case of some of the larger hedges it may not now be possible to complete them until after the bird nesting season.

We continue to have issues with waterlogging on areas of our amenity areas, particularly in Saltaugh Road and as soon as the ground dries up enough to withstand the machinery passing over it we will be installing drainage crates and clearing blocked channels.

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The Chair and members of the PC along with representatives from St. Nicholas Church have had two very successful meetings with the new Headteacher and have begun to develop some really exciting partnership projects linked to the Curriculum. The first meeting of the 'Youth Council' scheduled for 30<sup>th</sup> March, is likely to be postponed, but will form a regular part of the young citizenship activity going forward, with support from the Parish Clerk.

The School has pledged their support to the Homelessness Project which the PC adopted as one of its 'community partner initiatives' and will be working with the PC to bid for funds to develop the Boyes Lane Amenity Area as an outdoor classroom or 'learning zone'.

On a visit to the school it was very pleasing to see how light bright and engaging the learning spaces looked. The design of the new Library, which was being completed as we visited, will provide a really engaging space for children to explore ideas and concepts and the Council are looking forward to becoming an integral part of the life of the School.

Pupils with musical talents had begun practicing to perform for us at the folk Festival in June and although this will no longer be going ahead they will be 'top of the bill' at the Folk Club once our social activities return to normal. So... if you are reading this, then please keep practicing!

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In March we welcomed two new Parish Councillors Mark Ward and John Duncan, bringing the Council once again to a 'full house.' Mark and John bring a wealth of experience and insights to complement the skills of 'Team KPC' and we are looking forward to working with them.

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Over the last two meetings the Council have been very busy with the consideration of a range of planning matters.

Some of the plans which have been considered and commented upon recently include:

- A Business on Ottringham Road, which was causing concern to residents
- Proposals to develop the site of the previous care facility at Horrocks Court
- A Housing development in the centre of the village
- A Pig Unit at North End Farm.

The business on Ottringham Road has now relocated. The initial plans for the development of the site at Horrocks Court were not approved by ERYC and have been resubmitted with amendments. The PC made a case to the Planning Committee in response to the proposed housing development and are awaiting the outcome. The proposal for the Pig Unit at North End Farm, is still under consideration. Residents have expressed a range of differing views regarding access routes to the unit, via Station Road and Eastfield Road, this being the responsibility of the Highways Dept at ERYC.

In response to requests of residents who attended the council meeting in March, the PC agreed to facilitate a public meeting and invite a representative from the Highways Dept. to address their concerns. Unfortunately, due to virus precautions, this will not be possible for the foreseeable future. The PC have contacted Highways who agreed to provide a statement, addressing the queries raised and this will be shared widely when it is received.

KPC would be grateful to be copied into any email correspondence as this will help with future discussions.

The PC tries hard to make balanced representations the views of residents on planning matters, remembering that developments often affect individuals differently, and it is not always possible to ensure the preferred outcome for everyone concerned.

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The Council were planning their role in supporting the VE Day celebrations, though these will now be postponed, but will be 'extra special' whenever we are able to come together again to mark the 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of peace in Europe.

Following advice to manage the spread of Corona Virus face to face meetings of the Parish Council will be suspended until the end of May and reviewed again at this point.

When PC meetings resume the PC will continue to meet on the second Wednesday of every month at the earlier time of at 7.00pm in the Village Hall.

Council are always keen to receive your ideas and feedback on any matter affecting the Community of Keyingham and this can still be done via email and telephone.

A postcard aimed at helping people to look after their neighbours if they are self-isolating.

The print-at-home template is being shared on social media, with those in need able to request shopping, urgent supplies or "a friendly phone call".

Becky Wass, from Falmouth, Cornwall, said the idea came to her as she and her husband discussed ways to help.

"Because fear has spread so quickly, its really important to try to spread kindness," she said.

Users are encouraged to leave items on doorsteps to avoid direct contact.

Ms Wass said the response to the cards had been "incredibly heart-warming".

"I do think in times like this everybody wants to do something to help, and this postcard just makes that a little bit easier."
