Parish Council 'Round-up'

Chairman's Annual Report

Cllr Parsons presented the Chairman's Annual Report, highlighting the projects and activities undertaken by the Council in 2018/19. Points of note included the delivery of all planned projects within budget, with an operating surplus enabling wider activity and providing for continency.

The Chairman thanked the Council for their hard work and commitment throughout the year, and for their support to himself in the role of Chairman.

Cllr Parsons stepped down from the role as Chairman at the end of the meeting and the Council members thanked him for his leadership.

Saltaugh road amenity area

It was resolved to proceed with replacing the safety floor covering beneath the play equipment on the Saltaugh road amenity area with black material. It was also agreed to proceed with the drainage

project on Saltaugh Road amenity area.

Dog Walking area

Due to multiple request being made to council for the creation of a separate area for dog owners to exercise their dogs and socialise with other dogs and dog owners several options were considered. The council decided to investigate 'in principle' the cost of creating a fenced off area on part of the Eastfield Road area.

The council is to obtain quotes for undertaking the work and to investigate covenants/ designations relating to the use of public spaces covenants/designations relating to the use of public spaces.

Allotments

It was noted that there are three whole plots (six half plots) currently available / untaken in row 7.

Fly tipping and Recycling

Councillors noted the guidance received form ERYC Environment Department regarding the repeated instances of fly-tipping at the recycling site on Dam Lane. ERYC advised the removal of the containers for recycling glass, as this was now covered by domestic collection, and to consider re-locating the clothing and textiles container to a position where it could be more closely monitored possibly by CCTV.

Boyes Lane

Improvements to the road surface from the main road to the Boyes Lane Amenity Area has started.

Problems with the Website.

It was reported that despite repeated requests, it was still not possible to upload material to update sections of the site, it was resolved to visit ERYC to meet with the IT Department in person.

St Nicholas Church

St Nicholas Church has been in the village for almost 900 years.

The first church was built in the 7th century, some parts of the present church date back to the 12th century. From that time until today there have been modifications to the church. It is now been decided to improve the facilities within the church by the addition of a kitchen and toilet. The new facilities will make the church a more comfortable place for people to visit whether it is for worship, weddings, funerals or baptisms. It would also mean that the church could be used for coffee mornings, garden parties or afternoon teas etc.

To make this vision happen, a group of ladies have got together to form The Friends of St. Nicholas Kitchen **project.** There aim is to raise enough money to install the kitchen and toilet. To start off the fund raising activities there will be a jumble sale on 25th May. This will be held in the Village Hall on Station Road. Other events will be scheduled throughout the year. (look out for these on the back page of this and future copies of FORWARD.) We live in changing times and the Church has changed as can be seen from the photo opposite.

Thirty years after it had been repaired the steeple was posing problems because of its weight on the tower, both of which were cracking. The solution was to reduce the weight on the tower

and the steeple had to be demolished, an operation which involved the removal of about 100 tons of material. The result was the church as it is today, the tower said to now look very much as it did in the 14th Century. When it was built brick-making had not been introduced in England and construction was of cobbles and mortar which were covered with dressed stone.

On Saturday 27th April, 15 dogs and their owners completed a sponsored walk in Keyingham. The aim was to raise £360 to equip local fire engines; Hornsea's second engine, Patrington engine, Preston engine and Withernsea's second engine with pet oxygen masks. Each kit costs £90 from the 'not for

profit charity' Smokey Paws, <u>smokeypaws.co.uk</u>

Jane Kinnear and Pam Campling organised the walk because Jane's friend tragically lost her two dogs in a house fire in Surrey last November. This is when the charity Smokey Paws came to Jane's attention and spurred her and Pam on to organise the walk.

With the help of their friends they managed to exceed their target of $\pounds 360$ - at the time of going to print they had raised $\pounds 770.16$ with further pledges to come in (total estimate $\pounds 850$).

With the extra money they are sending a further 5 kits to the Humberside Fire

& Rescue Service which will be distributed to the second engines at Beverley, Driffield, Market Weighton and Pocklington and East Hull for its first engine.

anyone offering you a deal the is too ROAD SAFETY good to miss don't be tempted. From the Humberside Police there is an alert about sellers who are offering goods e.g. power tools, chainsaws and generators while shoppers are unloading their shopping. The deal offered sounds too good to miss, don't be caught out!! These people use pushy tactics and have at times been known to put goods in the boot of someone's car and then ask for money. Incidents have happened in the carpark of a Holderness supermarket. Remember, if it sounds too good to be true it probably is too good to be true. Police advice is never buy things from cold callers or if you are approached when you are out and about. Always do your research before buying any goods or services.

Your local policing team is visiting every victim of burglary and theft from garages and sheds. Crime prevention advice is being given together with methods of marking and recording your property.

The team continues to work with their partners to promote better road safety. This will include community speed watch patrols plus cycling and school crossing patrol.

Remember your vigilance could help to prevent a crime - be alert for any suspicious happening and report incidents to the police by ringing 101 and giving the Humberside Police as many details as you can, for example descriptions of people involved age, features, height and dress. or vehicles involved.
