

KEYINGHAM VILLAGE PLAN STEERING COMMITTEE

The village hall is the centre around which much of the social side of village life revolves. In Keyingham we are fortunate that we have a large village hall which has the facility to offer many varied activities. The history of the development of the hall is interesting because it has evolved to cater for the needs of villagers as they have changed over the years. (More about this is in the next issue of FORWARD.) It is run by a committee who are constantly looking for activities which will encourage people to use the hall. The hall is self-financing so is dependent upon villagers supporting the activities held in the hall for revenue. The old adage 'use it or lose it' can be applied to the building as without organisations renting the hall no income would be generated. Of late funding has been obtained from the e-on Community Support Fund which will be used to undertake several repairs and renovations to the Institute. Regular activities taking place in the Institute are advertised on the back page and details of 'one off' activities are advertised in the FORWARD newsletter, if details are given to the editor (details on the back page), and on posters displayed around the village.

The hall can be hired by individuals or groups, the more the merrier and can be used for entertainment, classes, parties, receptions etc. Please ring Caroline on 603277 and she will be able to give you details of the facilities available and the cost of room hire.

PARISH COUNCIL.

The public participation, not minuted, now takes place at 7.30 p.m. prior to the commencement of the official meeting. Anyone wishing to discuss a matter with the Council is welcome to attend. They can then leave or stay for the remainder of the meeting.

Summary of minutes of the July/August minutes.

As so many members of the public were present the Chairman brought forward the item concerning Keyingham Board School at both meetings. The Clerk advised the Council that as a Director of the Company Cllr Haxby was not allowed to take part in any discussion or vote. Cllr Parsons could as he is a member of the Committee but is not a Director. Standing Orders were suspended to allow the public to state their views and discussion followed. Full details of the minutes of all meetings are available on the website www.keyinghamparishcouncil.co.uk or from the Clerk. At the July meeting it was proposed that legal advice be sought on the matter, the proposal was accepted. Then the matter was deferred until the next meeting. At the August meeting discussion took place as to the advice that had been sought after which a proposal was made to defer once again the decision, this was defeated but the proposal to to give a promissory, with conditions, was passed. A recorded vote was taken the result of which was 4 in favour, 3 against, with one abstention, one Cllr absent and one Cllr not allowed to vote. Details can be obtained from the Clerk

Playing fields.

Children have vandalised the Youth Shelter on Saltaugh Road playing field. Names have been given to the police who are handling the incident. Broken glass, which was cleared up by a Councillor, has also been found on the field. The filling in of the dyke is proving very costly but discussion is ongoing. The gym equipment for use by members of the public should be arriving in 6-8 weeks. The Councillor who applied for a £10,000. award to repair the roof on the Village Hall was congratulated on the success of the bid.

The inner gate is in need of repair and as the padlock on the car park gate was once again missing more padlocks would have to be purchased. Enquiries have been made about new goal posts and nets for Eastfield Road playing field. The cost is high but the matter is being pursued. It was suggested that if any further commuted sum become available that play equipment for the under 5 year olds be purchased.

<u>The Garth.</u> Looking tidy. The handrails have been repainted by a Councillor.

Litter picking.

The post of Street Cleaner is to be advertised for two weeks in the Gazette. *Allotments*.

The new Allotment Cup, to be presented at the Village Show, was shown to councillors. It was suggested that the old one be given to KBS for the archives. Notice has been given to those allotment holders whose allotments have not been kept up to the agreed standard. One holder has been given notice that their agreement will not be renewed next year. The allotment gate has been damaged by a vehicle, as it was in a poor condition it is to be replaced by a new one together with the side fence.

Cemetery.

The bench in the cemetery needs repairing, this work is in hand. A query was raised about access to the footpath adjacent to the cemetery. The Clerk is to contact ERYC and the land owner on the matter. As access to the path by contractors can be denied it was agreed that the hedge be left to grow with the area to which access can be made cut by contractors. It was suggested that a strip of land enabling ownership should be purchased but the cost is prohibitive. Shelving for the tools is to be put up in the shed.

Churchyard.

The tree at the lower entrance to the Churchyard has been pruned.

War Memorial.

Thanks were given to David Kennedy for grouting the pavers on the Memorial area.

Streets and Verges.

The area outside of the school gates needs tidying. This is the reponsibility of ERYC. Work is still outstanding from the Streetscene inspection. Enquiries are being made about the repainting of the fence round the Waudby Garth Road play area. Litter and dog mess are again causing concern. The area round the recycling bins is covered with broken glass and litter. ERYC to be contacted. The Hedon depot is to be contacted about the removal of the works signs left along the road.

Boyes Lane.

The bridge in the Boyes Lane field has been repaired. Both apples and pears have been grown on the field this year.

The plastic bollards are now in situ on Hull Road. Hopefully the verges will be protected. The wall around the bed under the village sign has been built and the area replanted.

<u>Village Plan.</u> Thanks were given to the residents who are tending the planters. The planter around the sign at the entrance to the village looks very attractive.

Extract from South East Holderness update.

Crime Prevention advice.

Although we live in a very low crime area, we are subject to offences such as burglaries or theft from vehicles. Please note that 50% of burglaries reported in the East Riding are through insecure doors or windows, likewise over 50% of cars broken into are insecure or have items of value on show. The crime prevention message is clear - LOCK IT OR LOSE IT. Sometimes we get complacent about security, but thieves are opportunists, and will travel into the East Riding looking for easy pickings.

LATEST SCAM - DON'T GET CAUGHT OUT.

A fraudster rings you at home claiming to be from your bank or even that they are the police which seems to be the latest ploy, telling you that they think your bank card has been used fraudulently. They suggest you ring your bank to ensure the call is genuine, they manage to stay on the line, so when you use your phone they answer. They ask you for your account details and your PIN. They then confirm your card has been used and ask you to package it up and then send a courier to collect it. The courier is often innocent and is just picking up an item and delivering it elsewhere. The fraudsters then have your card and your PIN!

Remember your bank and the police will NEVER ask for your PIN number or your card.
