Parish Council Round Up August & September

Road Safety in Keyingham

At the July meeting of the Council members of the public joined with Parish Council members in exploring the possible options for improving the safety of the road crossing. Highways Engineers and Ward Councillor Claire Holmes responded to questions and challenges regarding the proposals and explained the options available.

Following extensive discussion between the Parish Council and ERYC Officers, it was agreed that the Parish Council would vote on the proposal at the August meeting in order to ensure that, if accepted, the works would proceed as part of the plan of works for the current financial year. The proposal, which can be viewed via the Parish Council website, incorporates road markings, lighting, signage and physical barriers to direct pedestrians towards the crossing and to prevent parking close to the crossing.

At the August meeting the Parish Council voted to adopt the proposal put forward by ERYC Traffic Management Team. We have not yet been informed when the work is due to commence and will post updates as and when we receive them. Please check the website for updates.

Antisocial Behaviour on the Village Green

Whilst there has been slightly fewer incidents of antisocial behaviour around the Village Green lately, sadly this problem persists and is going to require support and action from a range of agencies to help us tackle it.

Councillors have recently met with the Antisocial Behaviour Team of ERYC who have conducted a survey of the area and made recommendations regarding: Reducing shrubs and bushes Increased lighting CCTV surveillance

The Parish Council is in the process of investigating sources of funding for additional lighting, CCTV cameras and other deterrents.

Remembrance Sunday

In anticipation of remembrance Sunday approaching Councillors discussed the arrangements for November 2022. It was agreed that observing remembrance in the Church Grounds at St Nicholas Church last year had been a well-received and provided a fitting tribute to those who had served, so it was agreed that the event would take place in the church grounds again this year. St Nicholas Church wardens asked us to note the difficulty in providing ministers to officiate at events across the benefice of churches and that timings may need to be adjusted to accommodate this.

Exact Details of the Remembrance event will be confirmed closer to the time and will be posted around the village and on the website.

Humber and North Yorkshire Health and Care Partnership



Since the first COVID-19 vaccine was given, it has saved lives, helped tens of thousands of people stay out of hospital, and made it safer for us to live with COVID. But the virus is still with us and is still making people very ill every day.

And, as we head into winter, flu presents further dangers. For most people flu is unpleasant, for some it can be very dangerous and even life-threatening, particularly those with certain health conditions. The flu vaccine is the best protection against getting seriously ill from flu and spreading it to other people.

Getting your flu and COVID vaccines are two of the most important things you can do to keep yourself and others around you safe this winter.

Experts advise that those at greater risk will need extra protection this winter. For Covid-19 and flu, everyone aged 50 and over, people with certain health conditions that put them at risk and frontline health and care staff will be offered a vaccine. To protect against flu, additional groups most at risk of getting seriously ill from flu or of passing it on to others, such as pregnant women, young children, primary school aged and some secondary school aged children will be offered protection. COVID-19 and flu can be serious for these groups and getting both COVID-19

and flu at the same time increases risk.

The COVID-19 autumn / winter programme is well under way for those at greatest risk. It is important people who are eligible come forward as soon as possible when it's their turn, for extra protection ahead of winter, when viruses circulate most and can cause greatest harm.

The NHS will let people know when it is their turn to come forward for their COVID-19 vaccine and more information is available on the NHS website. Once invited, people can look on the dedicated vaccinate Hull and East Riding website www.vaccinatehullandeastriding.co.uk to see where in their local area vaccinations are available and then book a confirmed appointment using the National Booking Service or by calling 119.

The COVID-19 and the flu vaccine can be given on the same day and some people might get both vaccines at the same time. However, this may not always be possible, so we encourage everybody to get each vaccination as soon as they can, rather than waiting to get both at the same time.

Please help to keep yourself and those around you safe against these viruses by getting vaccinated when you are invited. You can find out more about what vaccinations you may need, and information about how to book an appointment, by visiting www.nhs.uk/flujab and
