Leadership in Action Keyingham Primary School Student Council and Governors

Shaping Positive Futures through Collaboration in Leadership

On 22nd January members of Keyingham Primary School Student Council attended the school Governors meeting to explain how they became a Councillor, what their role entails and how they were needing support for their future project.

In a joint question and answer session the Student Council and Governing body gained insights into each other's roles and responsibilities and discussed how they could work together to enhance the school and its strategic plan.

The Governing Board asked:
How did you become a student council member?

Why did you put yourself forward to be a student council member?

What are your 5 Student Council Values?

How are the 5 Student Council values being monitored in school?

What projects have you planned for this year?

Governors were impressed by the thoughtful and detailed answers the Student Council provided. Student Councillors explained that they had put themselves forward and then peers voted for them in their classes. The 2 students with the highest votes were then elected.

Parish Council Round Up January 2025

Keyingham Village Hall

Following a busy and successful Christmas period the renovations in the Village Hall continue with a full re-paint of the Main hall in cream and green. Grateful thanks are expressed to Crown Paints for kindly donating paint and materials. Volunteers to help with painting and repairs are always welcome so if you would like to get involved, please contact a member of the Village Hall Committee.

Village Green – Looking Ahead -

In the last edition we were celebrating the ‘switch-on’ of lights on the beautiful tree which arrived at the end of November and was installed and dressed by officers from the Street lighting Team at ERYC. The tree survived the switch-on event on 6th December only to be toppled by strong winds a day later! However, thanks to some prompt action it was soon restored and we were able to continue to enjoy it throughout the Christmas period.

At the January meeting Councillors agreed to continue with this arrangement for the following year. Village Hall Committee members and the Christmas Lights Group will be actively seeking feedback over the next few months on how the switch-on event can be enhanced and built upon.

Councillors will be considering how to ensure that future events on the village Green can be managed safely for the enjoyment of all participants.

Boyes Lane Recreation Ground

This time of year tends to be a quiet one for grounds maintenance and care of the landscape, however some activities are continuing weather permitting. Some small mending-up jobs to locks, gates and fences are being undertaken with the help from volunteers and the pupils from Oakfield School. The next meeting of the

Boyes Lane Recreation Ground Trustees will be on 11th February 7.00pm in the Village Hall.

Saltaugh Road Amenity Area

At the January Meeting Councillors were joined by members of the Vikings Rugby Club to consider their request to replace one of the cabins currently serving as a food service area as it was no longer fit for purpose. Councillors reviewed plans, images and discussed potential impact on surrounding facilities. The plans were met with support and received particular interest from Keyingham Primary School who see the proposal as an opportunity to strengthen the partnership between the Rugby Club and the School, particularly as many of the pupils were also club members.

Joint fundraising activities between the School and the club were discussed along with shared benefit to both organisations in the future.

Planning

Following the notification of an appeal by the developer, against the decision by ERYC Planning Department to refuse planning permission for a proposed development of 16 affordable homes on land bordering Church Lane. Councillors received notification prior to the January meeting that the Independent Committee had dismissed the appeal. It was confirmed that, with respect to this proposal, there could be no further consideration.

Strategic Development of dwellings – land formerly occupied by Village Nurseries. The Parish Council received confirmation in January that this development had now formally been approved, with some 27 requirements and conditions. The Parish Council is pursuing enquiries

with the developer and with Yorkshire Water to understand in greater detail the proposals regarding surface and foul water. With the support of ERYC Ward Councillors, the Parish Council is seeking a direct discussion regarding the arrangements for drainage and the positioning of a light-controlled crossing over the A1033. Further updates and the opportunity to feed views into this discussion will be posted on the PC website.

Parish Precept 2025/26

At the beginning of the year the Parish Council returned a request to the ERYC for a Parish Precept of £51,300.00 an increase of £2,500 on the previous year to cover increased costs including the Service Contract for CCTV. Councillors also agreed small increases to burial charges, which were last reviewed in 2019, and allotment rents to cover increases in rates and utilities for these areas.

Allotments

For those Allotment Gardeners amongst you please note that allotments rents are now due. Allotment tenants will be receiving individual reminders and details of how to pay. The allotment rents have been increased by a small amount this year from £26.00 pa for a full plot to £30.00 pa to cover increased water costs. The Parish Council now uses on-line banking and computerised accounts, so we are moving towards BACS payments for all transactions wherever possible. There will be two 'in-person' payment sessions in the Village Hall 10.00 - 11.30 on 19th and 26th February. Happy Gardening New Year!

Cemetery

When discussing the precept for 2025/26 Councillors agreed a small increase in burial charges to cover the rates payable on the Cemetery.

A full list of the new Burial Fees, which come into force on 1st April 2025 can be

found on the PC website and in the Parish notice board.

Councillor Vacancy

There is still a vacancy on the Parish Council. All eligible individuals are welcomed, and public participation is seen as a valuable contribution to help shape direction and decision-making in the best interests of the village as a whole. The Parish Council would especially welcome interest from individuals involved with youth groups and activities in Keyingham.

The Parish Council now has a membership of individuals with a wide range of backgrounds and skill sets including Education, Construction, Transport, Law, Leisure, Local Government and Business many of whom continue to work within local companies who support the rural economy. If you think you may be interested and would like a clearer understanding of the business of the Parish Council please consider coming along to a meeting as an observer or contact the Clerk for an informal chat with no obligation.

Reasons given for why they had put themselves forward included:

- It would give them a good experience
- They knew they would enjoy it
- They wanted a challenge
- To know more about what others think
- To get more involved with school ideas
- To be more curious and courageous
- To have more responsibility
- To help others
- They knew it would be interesting
- To listen to others

The Five Values chosen by the first group of Student Councillors back in 2021, and are still in place now, are: **Kindness, Courage, Curiosity, Respect, Behaviour.**

Student Council members described the ‘**Values Score Card**’ process. It is made up of three faces (Red-unhappy / Amber-ok / Green-happy) which are placed in three locations in their meeting room. Students vote on each of the values by standing beside one of the faces, this is then recorded

and feed back to their classes. Each year group explains why they chose the Red, Amber or Green Face, with examples to support their choice. This process is repeated at each meeting. Information is shared throughout all classes and with the senior leaders of the school.

Projects that this year’s Student Council have participated in include attending and presenting at 2 Church services. These include Remembrance Sunday and the Civic Service in partnership with the Parish Council and other Community Leaders.

Student Council members explained that this academic year, they were investigating different ways of using their ‘student voice’ and asked for the support of the Governors in creating a podcast to describe how their voice could be used to influence and create positive change. The Governors have asked the Student Council to help them recruit further Governors through their podcasts and have openly said they would like to get involved.

Further discussions will take place around how both parties can help one another in supporting the school.
